Council proves a perfect training ground for talent

Council's role as a trainer of talented young people has been highlighted with a host of current and former Council workers being honoured with local, state and national awards through Programmed Skilled Workforce.

Former Council electrical apprentice Corey Goodall was named National Apprentice of the Year and previous Council IT trainee Michael Lever was named National Trainee of the Year.

Now based in Mackay, former Council fitter apprentice Matthew Matulovic was named the NSW Northern Apprentice of the Year, while closer to home,

current third-year horticulture apprentice Cooper Conlan was named TAFE Parks and Gardens Apprentice of the Year.

"At the moment I'm working down at Lovers Rocks at Duranbah getting to learn very different skills like construction and building, as well as my trade as a horticulturalist," Cooper Conlan said.

"It's not a bad office view here. Yep it's lovely!

"It can be daunting starting an apprenticeship and starting at a whole new workplace but Council is a really good place to learn. I'm comfortable here and I'm always asking questions.

"It's helped me to grow and be a lot more confident about what I'm doing." Council's Director Corporate Services, Liz Collyer, said providing increased employment opportunities for young people is a focus of Council's Workforce Management Plan.

"We really need to plan for our future workforce needs here at Council and to build on the 13 per cent of employees we currently have who are under the age of 35." she said.

"Council has trained nearly 140 cadets, apprentices and trainees since 1997, including 28 who have gone on to permanent careers at Council after their training.

"We currently have 18 apprentices and trainees and three cadets across the areas of building surveying, GIS, surveying, mechanical, electrical, carpentry, fitting and turning, metal fabrication and horticulture trades, business administration and aged care traineeships."

Central perks for Kingscliff

Kingscliff residents are set to get their first taste of the town's new Central Park this week, with a section of the safety fencing scheduled to be moved back.

Paths in Kingscliff Central Park were being finalised last week and early this week, allowing the south western corner of the park to be opened to the public.

"It's a major milestone in the Kingscliff Foreshore Revitalisation, as work progresses steadily," Project Manager Stewart Brawley said.

"The adjacent section of fencing will move east a short distance, to allow pedestrians to access paths away from the road and carpark.

"It will also mean they will also be able to access a temporary Visitor Information Centre (VIC) and Kingscliff Foreshore Information office."

VIC volunteers are scheduled to move this week, from their office in the Kingscliff Community Hall to the nearby temporary building.

The volunteers will be on hand to answer questions about the foreshore revitalisation, as well as the usual tourism enquiries, and will be given a guided tour of the revitalisation site this week.

There will still be some additional plantings at the site. However, there will be no further interruptions to public access to the boat ramp.



Hey tosser! Put it in the bin

Tweed residents are being encouraged to report a 'tosser', with a particular view to address dumping hot spots.

"We're urging residents to make use of the NSW EPA's online reporting service, part of the **Hey Tosser! Put it in the Bin** campaign, to help stop illegal dumping," Council's Coordinator Waste Management, Rod Dawson, said.

"Last month's introduction of a new on-call household clean-up service will go a long way towards addressing illegal dumping. By replacing the biannual bulk waste kerbside collection, there will be less impetus and opportunity for people to dispose of their waste improperly.

"However, there continues to be rubbish left at a number of public spaces that have been hot spots in the past.

"Council is doing what it can to police this dumping and we're appealing to residents near these locations to also be vigilant," he said.

"If they see someone dumping rubbish from a vehicle, they can report it by visiting $\underline{\text{epa.nsw.gov.au/heytosser.}}$ "

The Report to EPA service was introduced in 2015 and has led to many thousands of reports and fines.

Tweed households that pay for Council's wheelie bin service can now receive up to two on-call household collections each year, to dispose of large waste items at a time that suits them.

Fraser Drive sewer upgrade starts

Council will begin work to upgrade a sewer main along Fraser Drive, between Botanical Circuit and Amaroo Drive, Banora Point, on Monday (14 August).

Traffic flow will be reduced to one lane through short sections as the job progresses. Motorists are advised to expect frequent short delays.

The 800,000 project to increase the capacity of the sewer main will take three months.

Stacey Reid, of Crosana Pty Ltd, last week added the final touches of paint to the new shotcrete cliff face above Tumbulgum Road, Murwillumbah. Stacey highlighted the coloured concrete face with shades of yellow, brown, black and white paint to mimic the look of natural rock. Over time, the wall will darken and moss will grow, together with vines to be planted in the built-in planter boxes at the toe of the wall and future garden beds at the top of the wall. The contractors last week completed the installation of the steel cables that will support the vertical garden before they left site at the end of stage one of the upgrade. Next, some Telstra and flood-monitoring infrastructure will be relocated and stormwater drainage installed. Then, new contractors will move in to start stabilising the riverbank. In the final stage, Council will plant vines and construct a wider road and shared-user path to complete the project by the end of the year.

EXHIBITION OF DRAFT WILDLIFE PROTECTION AREAS POLICY VERSION 1.0

Council is preparing a new policy which declares locations in Tweed Shire as Wildlife Protection Areas. The Draft Wildlife Protection Areas Policy will improve the conservation of public land by reducing threats to wildlife, by prohibiting domestic dogs and cats from the declared areas.

The policy applies to public land with high nature conservation value that are considered at risk from the impacts of domestic dog and cats.

The draft policy is on public exhibition until 12 September 2017 and the Tweed community is invited to comment by 26 September 2017, following a decision of Council on 20 July to exhibit the draft.

Rail trail still on track

Alternative funding options will be sought for the Tweed stage of the Northern Rivers Rail Trail, following a recent announcement the project was not successful in the latest round of the Federal Government's Building Better Regions fund, Council's Director Engineering, David Oxenham, said.

"Council still believes it is a viable project and will welcome any other avenues to secure the necessary funding," Mr Oxenham said.

Council applied for \$6.5 million from the Building Better Regions fund to build the 24km section of the rail trail from the Murwillumbah railway station to Crabbes Creek.

In July, the State Government announced it had reserved \$6.5 million for the project, securing half the funds needed for the \$13 million initiative.

"It has been a wonderful community effort to get the project this far, led by Northern Rivers Rail Trail Inc.," Mr Oxenham said.

"The State Government's recent announcement and the community turnout to celebrate that announcement was a great indication of the level of support for this venture.

"We have also valued the strong support of our State and Federal Members, who have recognised the tremendous economic and public health boost the rail trail would bring to the Tweed and the Northern Rivers.

"So it was disappointing to learn that we had been unsuccessful in securing funding through this round of the Federal Government's Building Better Regions fund," he said.

"It would be a real lost opportunity if we were unable to convert the disused rail corridor into a major asset for this area, so we will continue to look for funding opportunities."
