Breathing life into community projects

Four Council facilities have received a boost thanks to NSW Government funding through the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

A total of \$594,606 in grants will breathe life into local community projects.

The Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, Tweed Regional Museum, Knox Park and the Tweed Regional Aquatic Centre will all benefit from the fund, which aims to deliver crucial local infrastructure to improve the quality of life of people living in regional NSW.

Cultural facilities Tweed Regional Gallery and Tweed Regional Museum have received a grant of \$198,202 for the following projects:

Tweed Regional Gallery – A new unisex accessible toilet serving gallery and café visitors. This includes installation of single prefabricated unit, associated site preparation, plumbing, furniture and finishing and fees.

Also included is construction of a paved walkway at the Gallery to provide universal public access and seating on the western side of the Gallery, incorporating improved access to the emergency

Land swap announced

A number of South Murwillumbah businesses devastated by the 2017 flood have put their hand up to move their operations to flood-free land, thanks to a groundbreaking \$3 million land swap arrangement funded by the NSW Government.

Under the deal, Council will now prepare the 16.11 hectare plot for development and apply for further State government grants to for the cost of infrastructure, such as roads, water and sewer.

Businesses would have up to 10 years to relocate. Their former flood-prone land would be back zoned, most likely for community or agricultural uses in order to remove impediments from the flood plain.

Priority was given to businesses in high velocity flood areas or of high value (more than 50 employees who lost more than \$1 million in the March 2018 flood).

The seven businesses interested in relocating employ around 300 people and include Shoobridge Transport, Williams Timber & Trusses, Hayes Steel and O'Connors Carrying Service.

evacuation point, and links to the artist in residence studio. The grant will cover site preparation, environmental compliance construction and associated landscaping and street furniture.

Tweed Regional Museum – Installation of 40kW solar PV to improve energy efficiency and sustainability, and enhance program capacity. The grant includes capital cost of 40kW solar PV and associated site works to ensure protection of equipment.

Murwillumbah's **Knox Park Revitalisation Stage 2a** also received a \$198,202 grant, which will allow for the creation of a new centrally located compliant amenities block and associated access pathways.

This project will activate Knox Park, increasing visitation by locals and tourists alike, boosting economic activity in the Murwillumbah CBD and creating jobs for locals.

The **Tweed Regional Aquatic Centre** in Murwillumbah will also receive \$198,202 grant to install a 165kW rooftop system, which will cover 20 per cent of the facility's power needs through renewable resources. The facility's two main roofs could accommodate 5,000 solar panels and reduce its carbon footprint by 189 tonnes of CO^2 emissions per year.

In brief ...

Connecting Tweed Heads South footpaths Council contractors start work this week constructing three sections of a 1.2m-wide footpath on Machinery Drive, Tweed Heads South, to form a continuous pedestrian path along the stretch of road starting next week.

Currently, footpath exists only outside the Aldi store. Once construction is complete, footpath will run from Minjungbal Drive to the western end of the Machinery Drive circuit. A pedestrian refuge will be installed at the eastern end of the Machinery Drive circuit.

Westbound traffic will be reduced to one lane flow when concrete trucks are on site with construction taking three weeks. Access will be maintained to all businesses and motorists should expect some short delays.

Increased activity along Tweed Valley rail corridor



Council is in the process of communicating with adjacent landholders regarding an increase in activity along the rail corridor.

Council staff, consultants and surveyors will be accessing the rail corridor and adjoining areas to collect information which will inform the various Rail Trail project assessments.

The works, which are required under NSW legislation, are to take place over the next six weeks and will include night surveys which will form part of the environmental impact assessment.

The night work will involve spotlighting animals within bushland on various sections of the rail corridor and within short sections of creeks intersected by the rail corridor,

Musicians Connecting Communities events in Kingscliff and Murwillumbah

Council has committed to giving the local music scene a boost by creating and supporting two upcoming events featuring local musicians.

In partnership with local venues Council will promote the Musicians Connecting Communities or MC² festivals in Kingscliff on 28 April and in Murwillumbah on 19 May.

Both festivals will feature a line-up of local musicians playing in various venues on the day, with attendees invited to listen in and support local businesses.

The events are the result of a successful grant application made by Council to the Live Music Office's Live and Local Initiative, funded by CREATE NSW.

Council Cultural Planner David Burgener said the festivals offer a chance for musicians to play in the shire and connect

with local venues.

"One of the intentions of the festivals is to establish relationships between Council, musicians and venue owners," Mr Burgener said.

"The idea is to help support live music in the shire by providing a family friendly event the whole community can enjoy.

"These festivals will make use of hotels and clubs but also less traditional venues such as cafes and even a tattoo parlour."

Another focus of the festivals will be an attempt to support the establishment of mentoring situations, especially for emerging artists just starting out on their musical careers.

Mr Burgener said Council hopes to organise a workshop associated with the festivals to support artists in understanding

what is expected of them in a professional environment.

"It's not just about bringing in experts and holding workshops

though, there are lots of musicians in the area with knowledge to s pass on," he said.

"Music plays an important role in supporting a vibrant community, not only for the artists involved or the local economy, but also when it comes to making connections between individuals and organisations.

"The name, Musicians Connecting Communities (MC²) really captures what the festivals are all about.

"We know the talent is out there and if Council can do something to help bring it along it is a worthwhile investment on many levels." An event will soon be created for the MC² Festivals on Council's Facebook page.

Tweed Valley Way open again at Blacks Drain

Tweed Valley Way at Blacks Drain, South Murwillumbah, which was washed away in the 31 March 2017 floods, has been rebuilt and was reopened to traffic last week.

The day after the floods, Council workers managed to rebuild a temporary single lane to reconnect the community isolated by the catastrophic failure. Since then, temporary traffic lights have been in place to regulate the one-way flow across the temporary section.

In November, Council awarded the contract to design and construct a permanent repair to Skeen Constructions Pty Ltd as the priority major flood road repair in the shire. That work was completed last week, with ancillary works to continue to the end of March. When required, one lane of the new section may be closed under the management of stop/slow flagmen to allow those ancillary works to continue.

The next major road repair to be undertaken in the shire will be Clothiers Creek Road.

The March flood caused approximately \$28.9 million of damage to roads and bridges. To date, more than 1100 minor road and bridge damage items have been repaired.

To recover road damage costs under Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA) and grant funding, Council cannot use its own workforce but must engage third-party contractors

New reservoir in pipeline to service developments

Council contractors will start work at the end of March to build a new three-megalitre water reservoir at Chambers Lookout, Banora Point, to service existing and future developments in the area.

The Chambers Lookout carpark will be closed until the end of the year for construction.

The new reservoir will provide additional supply capacity for the current and future developments planned for the area, catering for the projected population growth as new houses are occupied.

"Some neighbours are like family and others you may not know yet - Neighbour Day is the perfect excuse to say hi and introduce yourself, or get together again and have a great time," Ms Tate said.

Local developers have contributed to the \$2.2 million cost of the project.

The reservoir will be built on Council-owned land next to the existing Chambers Lookout reservoir near the corner of Terranora Road and Fraser Drive. About 1500 square metres of regrowth vegetation will be removed to allow the new infrastructure to be built.

The new reservoir will be of reinforced concrete construction with an aluminium roof and be built by Stirloch Constructions Pty Ltd.

Road stabilisation works

Council has awarded two contracts to stabilise and reseal eight urban roads at a cost of about \$1.6 million.

The program of work will start in Tweed Heads on 26 March, with all of Agnes Street and Cox Drive to be stabilised and re-asphalted. After Easter, the contractor then moves to Banora Point, where

most of Mariners Crescent and Old Ferry Road (from Mariners Crescent south to north of Mariners Crescent north) will be done prior to moving to Bogangar to stabilise a section of Cabarita Road from Oleander Avenue to Poinciana Drive.

Then the program goes to Chinderah where all of Morton Street will be stabilised and re-asphalted, together with the section from Tweed Coast Road to Morton Street.

The program then switches to nightworks at Banora Point to stabilise and re-asphalt a number of sections on Leisure Drive, from the Nudgee Street roundabout to east of Greenway Drive, and Fraser Drive, from Vintage Lakes Drive south to the Coles supermarket on Leisure Drive. Nightworks will be from Sunday to Thursday night from 7pm-5am. This work will occur in mid to late April.

All nearby residents will be notified of works before they begin. All work requires the existing asphalt to be milled off, prior to the roads being stabilised using cement, then bitumen sealed. Then, about a week later, another contractor comes in to re-asphalt the roads.

Motorists are requested to drive slowly through roadworks and obey all signs and the directions of traffic controllers.

Electronic signs will notify motorists of works before they begin. The Commonwealth Games on the Gold Coast are not expected to affect these works but any residents attending games events are advised to plan ahead.
