# Olympic success inspires young swimmers

The wave of success enjoyed by the Australians in the pool at the Tokyo Olympics is having an impact on budding Tweed stars of the future.

Head of coaching and programs at Tweed Regional Aquatic Centres (TRAC) Gavin Urquhart said the Olympics had inspired many youngsters to hit the water and with news that the 2032 Olympics will be coming to Brisbane has provided juniors with added incentive.

"We have between 35 and 45 swimmers in our squads per day and during the Olympic pool events, we would tape the swims and watch the replays with the kids," Gavin said.

"There's no doubt that the achievements of the Australians has really served to inspire our local young swimmers."

Gavin, who has been coaching for about 10 years at Kingscliff, said the facility had enjoyed producing promising young swimmers at local, state and national age group levels.

"We have also recognised those swimmers who started out here at Kingscliff and gone on the become Olympians with our honour boards," he said

## Our cockatoos need you

Glossy Black-cockatoos are one of Australia's smallest and rarest cockatoos and the Tweed is fortunate to have a small population living in the valley.

Once a year, volunteers come together to participate in the Glossy Black Conservancy's bird count and this year, the Birding Day will take place over 2 days on 11-12 September across South East Queensland and north eastern NSW.

Everyday people and experienced birders alike will take part over the 2 days to search out this secretive bird, identify feed trees, record signs of feeding, and to photograph and record bird behaviour.

Knowing where the cockatoos are means we can do a better job of protecting them and their habitat.

## Card program keeps money in local shops to benefit economy

A program aimed at encouraging locals to shop local and support local businesses has been launched by Council, the Murwillumbah **Business Chamber and the Tweed Tourism Company.** 

The free Why Leave Town gift card program is designed to keep money within the local community with the initial program on the Tweed being wheeled out in Murwillumbah.

Using an EFTPOS-based system, shoppers can purchase a card at a 'Load Up Store' where they can put money onto the card - anywhere between \$10 and \$1000.

This card can then be used to make purchases of goods or services at participating stores within Murwillumbah (following COVID-Safe practises). This means every time a card is purchased and loaded up, the money stays local.

The Why Leave Town cards can be purchased as gifts for family and friends, raffle or competitions, prizes or incentive rewards in the workplace or just for everyday use.

Murwillumbah Business Chamber President Nick Moran was enthusiastic about the program and looked forward to it beginning in the town.

### Soil science experts share their knowledge at workshops

Soil science experts who are passionate about the land are coming to the Northern Rivers to share their knowledge through a series of workshops next month.

The Soils Knowledge Network (SKN) is a group of experienced soil scientists who will be holding workshops in Tweed, Byron and Lismore with the local event on Tuesday 7 September (subject to COVID-19 restrictions at the time).

The Tweed workshop will provide information on soil nutrient testing and interpretation, understanding soil structure and erodibility as well as management techniques to improve soil health and productivity.

Tweed Shire Council's Sustainable Agriculture Program will provide an update on a series of trials being undertaken on five local vegetable growers' farms as part of a National Landcare Program Smart Farms Small Grants project.

North Coast Local Land Services are collaborating to host these workshops and numbers are strictly limited so book early.

Participants are urged to bring along a sample of their own soil and a recent soil test for the practical sessions.

### **Meeting schedule confirmed**

Councillors have adopted a meeting schedule to see them through the remainder of the term.

The new schedule, adopted at last Thursday's ordinary Council meeting, was developed following the recent postponing of the NSW Local Government election by 3 months, to 4 December 2021.

All meetings will go ahead as per usual practice - Planning Committee meetings will be held on the first Thursday of the month from 5:30 pm and Council meetings will be held on the third Thursday of the month from 5:30 pm, with the exception of the meeting on Thursday 28 October, which will deal with Council's annual financial statements.

The Public Forum will also proceed as normal, starting an hour earlier at 4:30 pm, offering residents an opportunity to address Councillors on matters included on the meeting agenda for the day. Attendance via audio-visual link can be arranged for anyone wishing to address the Public Forum who is unable to attend in person due to public health orders.

Ordinary Council meetings will be held on Thursdays 19 August, 16 September and 28 October, while Planning Committee meetings will be held on 2 September and 7 October. A combined Ordinary and Planning Committee meeting will be held on 4 November before the commencement of the caretaker period.

Manager Corporate Governance Stephanie Papadopoulos said Council was doing all it could to ensure decision making continues in the Shire while complying with COVID-Safe guidelines.

"To accommodate as many community members as possible while allowing for COVID-Safe distancing requirements, all meetings for the remainder of the term will be held in the Harvard Room at Tweed Heads Administration Office," she said.

"Anyone wanting to attend the meetings in person must book via our online booking system or watch the meetings from the comfort of your own home via the livestream service.

"If you are subject to public health orders please ensure you comply. If you are not able to leave home, we encourage you to access the meetings via the livestream at tweed.nsw.gov.au/council-meetings.

In keeping with legislation, the current Mayor will remain in the role for the remainder of the term. The role of Deputy Mayor will be recontested at the Council meeting on 16 September when the oneyear term of the incumbent ends.

Councillors elected in December 2021 will serve a reduced term of 2 years and 8 months, with subsequent election expected to remain on schedule. The next election will proceed as planned in September 2024.

# From the green bin to garden compost

It's a 'green' light for a new, state-of-the-art facility at the Tweed Recycling and Landfill Centre at Stotts Creek that will process the Tweed residents' food and garden organic waste.

Although the Tweed has not been included in the Northern Rivers

The \$7 million Tweed Organics Processing Facility will turn organic material, collected in green kerbside bins from across the Tweed, into

Up to 25,000 tonnes of food and garden organics can be processed annually on site – with the compost soon to be made available to households, farmers and businesses as well as being used on Councilmaintained parks and gardens.

The facility has been constructed on behalf of Council and will be operated by NSW organics recycling business Soilco for the next 10 years.

It is the largest of its type in the Northern Rivers and will function as an enclosed composting facility which will also be environmentally sustainable with features such as a 99KW solar power system. Director Sustainable Communities and Environment Tracey Stinson

said there would be further benefits to the environment as organic waste will be processed locally, instead of sending it to a facility in South East Queensland. "By processing food and organics in the Tweed we'll also reduce our

carbon footprint and logistics costs," Ms Stinson said. "This is also about reducing the amount of waste going to landfill

and educating residents to put all their food and garden organic waste into their weekly green bin collection – so it can be turned into high quality compost to benefit the local environment."

The project is supported by the NSW Environmental Trust as part of the NSW EPA's Waste Less, Recycle More initiative, funded from the waste levy. The initiative provides funding support to councils and other organisations to build facilities to increase the amount of organic waste diverted from landfill in NSW.
