# What's your Plan B?

Pubs and clubs around the shire have joined with Council to promote the What's Your Plan B campaign from behind the bar.

They are challenging drinkers to think about their Plan B before they drink. If you're having a few drinks, driving is not an option. There's plenty of Plan B answers to get you safely home. They are practical and easily implemented and they cost a lot less than the alternative of driving under the influence and risking a crash.

As a driver's blood-alcohol concentration rises, so does the risk of being involved in a crash:

- 0.05 = double the risk
- 0.08 = 7 times the risk
- 0.15 = 25 times the risk

Motorbike riders are at even greater risk from drink riding because alcohol affects balance. In NSW, almost 20 per cent of riders involved in fatal crashes have a blood alcohol content (BAC) over 0.05.

Drink-driving is one of the biggest killers on our roads, with 23 per cent of fatal crashes and 10 per cent of injury crashes in the Tweed involving a driver with a BAC over 0.5. In the five years from 2011 to the end of 2015, there were 187 crashes in the Tweed Shire involving a drink-driver.

# Filming gets the green light

Tweed Shire Council's Tweed Coast Reserves Trust resolved at an Extraordinary Meeting on Friday to issue a temporary film licence to Warner Bros for the purpose of filming at Hastings Point.

The Trust also resolved to conduct a workshop subsequent to the film with Screen NSW invited to be involved as the facilitator.

The workshop would involve local residents, community groups, Council staff, and interested councillors working to develop a protocol for the future management of filming in the locality.

As part of the workshop, the owner of the local Marine Environment Centre will be invited to address the group on the significance of the rocky foreshore at Hastings Point.

Work at the Hastings Point site will begin in the next few weeks and, while the production will be for a period of approximately eight weeks, pedestrian access to the headland will not be impeded (apart from several days of full filming) and community members will still be able to access the majority of the site throughout the whale-watching season.

### Long delays expected on some Tweed Shire roads

Motorists are advised to avoid three areas of the Tweed Shire where roadworks are likely to cause long delays this week and next.

In Tweed Heads, Kennedy Drive, between Norman Street to Crystal Waters Drive, will be reduced to one-lane flow for about two weeks as Council replaces a water main on the southern side of the bridge.

Motorists are encouraged to travel around the worksite via Ducat Street, Mugga Way, The Quarterdeck and Norman Street to avoid long and frequent delays.

In South Murwillumbah, contractors this week begin resurfacing River Street, from Colin Street to the end of River Street; Stafford Street; and.

Hartigan Street, from River Street to Eyles Avenue.

The work to profile off each of the old surfaces and apply a bonding layer will take one day. Then, about a week later, the contractors will return to apply the asphalt wearing surface.

In Cudgen on Friday through to the end of Sunday, motorists are urged to find an alternate route while stabilisation works are carried out on Tweed Coast Road, from 190m north of Cudgen Road intersection to 400m south of Crescent Street.

That work will close down at the end of Sunday, with the contractors returning the following Sunday (16 July) to re-asphalt the road.

# Muriel's dress steals spotlight in Tweed on Film



What do Muriel Heslop – lead character of PJ Hogan's classic film *Muriel's Wedding* – and *Pirates* of the Caribbean anti-hero Captain Jack Sparrow have in common?

Both have strong connections to the Tweed and feature in the Tweed Regional Museum's upcoming exhibition Tweed on Film, opening today (4 July).

Muriel's wedding dress, on loan from the National Film and Sound Archive of Australia, will be a centrepiece of the exhibition and feature alongside rare surviving film props from *Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Men Tell No Tales*.

"Replica whale bones, now part of the Museum's permanent collection, will be on display for the first time since they formed part of the skeleton filmed on location at Hastings Point. They're so real they even smell like the ocean," exhibition curator Erika Taylor said.

"Muriel's wedding dress is definitely a fashion statement, and a coup for us to have on display."

PJ Hogan grew up in Murwillumbah and Tweed Heads and attended Mt St Patrick College and Tweed River High School. Son of a local farmer turned councillor, PJ has spoken about how much he drew upon family experiences when writing and directing both *Muriel's Wedding* and the more recent *Mental*.

Museum Director Judy Kean said the Tweed had been the inspiration and location for many films, TV series and documentaries and continued to be a very popular film location.

To complement the exhibition, the Museum will host a range of public programs, including a Movie Magic location bus tour on Saturday 5 August, as well as events in collaboration with ABC North Coast and Screenworks Northern Rivers NSW.

# Council one-third way through flood road repairs

Council has fixed almost one-third of the road and bridge defects across the shire left by the March floods.

The tally to date is 460 repairs completed out of a total of 1514 defects identified in the immediate aftermath.

"While we're tracking well on repairing the damage to our roads and bridges, this work is going to go on for the best part of a year just to get the bulk of the less complex repairs done," Senior Engineer Construction Nigel Dobson said.

"We believe we have a good picture of the damage throughout the shire, so we ask that the community only contact us if they notice new damage or feel the road or section of road should be closed as unsafe.

"Of course we want to keep as many roads open and trafficable as possible, so we ask motorists to slow down and take extra caution, especially in the wet as more landslips and rock falls may occur."


The damages bill from the flood for roads and bridges sits at \$23.5 million. Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA) will pick up \$17.5 million of that tab, leaving Council to fund a shortfall of \$6 million out of its planned capital works and maintenance budgets.

"Finding \$6 million within our existing budgets means that the knock-on effect of the flood will flow into the next financial year and beyond as we rejig our planned works program to meet our more immediate flood-recovery needs.

"Also, we cannot use our own workforce or plant on flood repairs as we cannot recover these costs through NDRRA funding. This puts a further brake on how much we can achieve and how quickly," Mr Dobson said.

Council is currently engaging more contractors to help speed the flood restoration works but resources are scarce given the widespread damage that Cyclone Debbie caused down the east coast.

"Realistically, it will be 12 months before the majority of damages will be fixed, with some individual damage items taking two to three years before they are completed."

# Green glow a reminder for organics service

Tweed Shire's northern border marker has received a green transformation to symbolise and celebrate the Tweed's focus on less to landfill.

Houses and duplexes in the Tweed's urban areas are shifting to a 3 Bin System from this week in a community effort to reduce the amount of organic waste ending up in landfill.

Central to the new system is a green-lid organics bin for all food and garden waste, which will be collected weekly and turned into rich compost to improve soil quality across the region.

Council's Acting Director of Community and Natural Resources, Rod Dawson, said the border marker would be lit with green light throughout July to remind people of the change.

"It's actually quite appropriate because we have been getting a lot of attention from people in Queensland who are interested in what we are doing," Mr Dawson said.

"When organic material goes to landfill it presents significant environmental challenges that are expensive for our ratepayers to deal with and the best solution is to keep it from getting there in the first place," he said.

"The 3 Bin System, which is already used by councils across the country, has been proven to take that organic material and turn it from a serious liability into a significant asset."

The NSW Government has set a target for all councils to divert at least 70 per cent of waste away from landfill by 2022. The 3 Bin System is expected

to make the largest contribution of any reform towards that goal in the Tweed, from the current local rate of about 42 per cent.

Under the previous system, about 30 tonnes of organic waste was being produced and sent to landfill every day in the Tweed.

"The 3 Bin System relies on residents separating their food waste and this small change in behaviour will have significant benefits for the whole community," Mr Dawson said.

"We can make this a positive change for our future but it does depend on each of us individually doing our bit.



"We are expecting some teething problems, just like when the yellow recycling bin was introduced, but we are confident everyone will settle in quickly."

This project was supported by the Environmental Trust as part of the NSW EPA's Waste Less, Recycle More Initiative, funded by the waste levy.

# Tweed Library upgrade reaches key milestone

This week's reopening of the Tweed Heads Civic and Cultural Centre auditorium will be music to the ears of local community organisations, with a number of events scheduled for the upgraded facility in July.

The auditorium has been closed since the start of the year as part of the ongoing Tweed Heads Library expansion, which includes upgrades to the entrance foyer leading into the auditorium.

Completion of the foyer and reopening the auditorium is the first major milestone of the library expansion project and had been delayed a few weeks because of unforeseen complications with upgrading the existing building.

Members of the Northern Rivers Symphony Orchestra met at the auditorium today and celebrated their return to the complex for their next concert on Sunday 16 July.

The orchestra was among a number of groups that relocated their events to other venues, in cooperation with Council, while the auditorium was closed.

The high-profile orchestra, comprising members from throughout the NSW North Coast and south-eastern Queensland and bringing together many professional musicians, will use its July concert, From the New World, to raise funds for Tweed Palliative Care.

Audiences and performers will notice a number of improvements to the entrance and foyer at the civic centre, while a number of less obvious upgrades will enhance safety at the venue.

Upgrades include accessible toilets in the entrance foyer, a new all-access ramp to the auditorium and library and improved access paths to the building.

"New entry doors and a replaced ceiling in the foyer will also create a more inviting entrance to the complex," Council's Manager Community and Cultural Services, Robyn Grigg, said.

"The temporary closure of the auditorium also provided an opportunity to rewire fire services in the building and install new lighting.

"Work on the rest of the library expansion is progressing steadily and further announcements on its progress will be coming soon."

### Dam wall closed to public

The gate on Clarrie Hall Dam Road leading to the dam wall will be locked next week and remain closed to the public until mid August as drillers work on site.

Contractors will be drilling test holes at the wall to confirm the strength of the underground rock and its suitability as a building material to raise the wall of Clarrie Hall Dam. A helicopter will be used to lift the drilling rig around the test sites.

In December 2015, Council resolved to begin planning for and buying the land needed to raise the wall of the dam. Its decision followed an extensive assessment of the options available to increase the capacity of the Tweed District Water Supply. The early investigations and planning needed to raise the dam wall are progressing well.

**Flood repairs:** This week work continues on Tyalgum Creek, Commissioners Creek, Doon Doon (including McCabe's Bridge), Stokers and Kyogle roads (between Byangum Bridge and towards Uki).

**Temporary traffic lights:** Clothiers Creek Road, Hogans Road, Tyalgum Road (Rocky Cutting) and Tweed Valley Way (Blacks Drain) for flood repair works. Fraser Drive, between Vintage Lakes Drive and Acacia Street, Banora Point (sub-development work).
