## It's time for another park makeover at Kingscliff

Kingscliff's Lions Park is undergoing a makeover, to improve the functionality of the park while also improving accessibility and recreation facilities for residents and visitors.

The park – the foreshore area immediately south of the Cudgen Headland Surf Life Saving Club – is a much-loved gathering space for many. The refurbishment is designed to complement its current use around markets, surf events and community get-togethers.

The work is the next component of the Kingscliff Foreshore Revitalisation Project which included the establishment of Rowan Robinson Park, a seawall to protect from erosion and a major upgrade of the Kingscliff Beach Holiday Park. There are no changes of use of the park proposed or any major structural changes.

The old shelters and barbecues are being replaced, accessibility improved through better connecting pathways, and the park will generally be dressed up. The shelters will be replaced in a central location allowing for a larger, clear open space to accommodate these activities, with additional facilities installed at the southern end of the park.

The design will complement the Rowan Robinson Park upgrade, with the same paving materials and park furniture carried through into the new design.

## Funding assists with salty water problem at weir

Council has welcomed \$100,000 in funding from the NSW Government's \$1 billion Safe and Secure Water Program to investigate options to prevent salt water contamination of the Tweed's water supply.

There is a continuing risk that Bray Park Weir, which supplies raw water for the Tweed Shire, may be overtopped by salt water during high tide and sea level anomaly events. The risk is forecast to increase with climate change.

A combination of high tides plus an unforeseen sea level anomaly caused Bray Park Weir to be overtopped in August last year. The salt water ingress caused the raw water provided to the Bray Park Water Treatment Plant to be contaminated and as a result, the contaminated salt water went into the Tweed drinking water supply.

Research undertaken by Water Research Laboratory, a unit of the University of NSW, forecasts such overtopping events will be more common in the future.

To mitigate the risk of salt water contamination of the Tweed water supply, Council has established the Bray Park Weir Tidal Protection Project Reference Group – a group of 10 community members and two Councillors– to investigate the best possible solutions to address this problem while avoiding or minimising impacts on the Tweed River and surrounding landholders.

The grant will be used to engage an independent consultant to

#### **Mt Warning Road closures**

Mt Warning Road will be closed for nine days midweek at the end of September and beginning of October to allow contractors to repair an upside rockface slip above the road.

#### New toilet block for Knox Park A start to construction of the new toilet block in

A start to construction of the new tollet block in Murwillumbah's Knox Park is not far away.

The first stages of the Knox Park stage 2 works have moved to the next phase with the erection of construction fencing and commencement of preparation works for the public toilets, to be built in a new central location in the park.

Over the past couple of months the old toilet block on Nullum Street was demolished and a new park entry and pathway constructed and pathway lighting installed.

It is anticipated that the toilet block will be completed late November, in time for Christmas.

The rest of the works, including demolition of the old toilet block and rotunda on Brisbane Street, the construction of an entry plaza to the park at the Brisbane Street/Wollumbin Street corner of the park and a widened central path through the park, will commence in 2019.

The project is funded through NSW Infrastructure Restart Program and the Commonwealth Government Building Better regions Fund.

## **Restoring Tweed's heritage**

Council has welcomed a \$30,000 grant from the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage which will begin the transformation of a disused amenities block in Murwillumbah into a usable and attractive community space.

A heritage assessment in 2011 found the Queen Street amenities block to be a good example of post-war architectural styles applied to public infrastructure and identified it as the only known example in the region.

The building is within the Murwillumbah Heritage Conservation Area identified by the Murwillumbah Community Heritage Study, and is located within close proximity to a number of other significant heritage items, including the Salvation Army Citadel, the Broadway building, Tweed Arcade, Main Street clock and BGF House.

Its heritage features include its zigzag metal balustrade, 'crazy paving' on the stone wall, blue painted render, curved façade, protruding flat roofline and glass bricks, while its front lawn has a commanding view over the street.

Council General Manager Troy Green said Council would now be able to restore the redundant building to promote appreciation of its heritage value.

"The building is presently in a derelict condition and considered by the local community as an eyesore, so apart from currently having no use, its heritage value is under appreciated," he said.

"Subject to sourcing further funds, the building's interior could then be fitted out, to become a useful community space which could be used by event organisers for an office for a short period or by other community groups."

The funding is a Heritage Near Me Activation Grant which targets heritage items which can be accessed by the public. Council will use the funding to:

- make structural improvements to the building
- restore the external façade to reflect and respect its local and regional heritage significance
- increase access to and awareness of the building by including it as a feature item on the soon-to-be-developed Murwillumbah Arts and Heritage Precinct App.

The amenities block was decommissioned a number of years ago due to the high cost of maintenance and repairs and as it was not able to be brought up to modern standards of accessibility. A new toilet block was constructed in Tumbulgum Road in its place.

## Dry times ahead so think about your water consumption

Despite the recent rain in the Tweed, the prolonged dry spell is forecast to continue across the country. It's as a timely reminder to Tweed residents to conserve water.

Already, some communities in NSW are running low on water, with dam levels down to as little as 10 per cent capacity.

Recently Council released water from Clarrie Hall Dam to maintain sufficient environment flows at Bray Park Weir while still providing for the Tweed District Water Supply.

"These releases are likely to continue so we can fully expect the level of Clarrie Hall Dam to fall," Acting Manager Water and Wastewater Rob Siebert said.

"In the Tweed we are fortunate as Clarrie Hall Dam is still 99 per cent full. But given the latest climate outlook and forecast for a dry spring from the Bureau of Meteorology, we all need to conserve water now to avoid water restrictions in the future if rain doesn't come.'

In the Tweed, water restrictions are triggered when the dam falls to 75 per cent capacity. These Level 1 restrictions aim to reduce consumption by 15 per cent. If the dam falls to 40 per cent capacity, the highest level of restrictions is triggered aimed at reducing consumption by 30 per cent.

"Our water consumption figure in the Tweed is going in the wrong direction and we all need to reset the goal to Target 160 litres per person per day to conserve this precious resource.

"In June 2013, the average Tweed resident was using 179 litres of water a day. Now, they are using almost 200 litres of water a day.

"We ask all residents to reset their commitment to Target 160L to avoid the possibility of water restrictions if this drought continues.
