# **New Code of Conduct for short-term holiday lets**

Last month the NSW Government announced a new Code of Conduct for the short-term holiday letting (STHL) sector.

The new Code, which comes into force on 18 December, includes guidance and obligations for hosts and guests centred on minimum standards of good behaviour. It also includes formal avenues for complaints and dispute resolution.

Council's Director Planning and Regulation Vince Connell has welcomed the new Code of Conduct but said that the NSW Government's full package of STHL reforms, relating to the permissibility and approvals for STHLs, will not be in place until mid-2021.

"This delay in the introduction of the new STHL planning reforms is likely to create some confusion for both landowners and proposed STHL operators, as well as residents who wish to raise concerns about STHLs," Mr Connell said.

"In recent years Council has been attempting to apply a balanced approach to its compliance and enforcement in respect of STHL enquiries and complaints, and will continue to apply this approach until the introduction of the new planning legislation."

Under the current legislation, STHL or rental accommodation is generally defined under the Tweed Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2014 as tourist and visitor accommodation.

This land use requires a Development Approval from Council, subject to site and permissible land use.

In the Tweed LEP residential zones, tourist and visitor accommodation is prohibited in the R1 General Residential, R2 Low Density Residential, and R5 Large Lot Residential zones, and permitted with consent in the R3 Medium Density Residential zone. In the rural zones tourist and visitor accommodation is prohibited in the RU1 Primary Production and RU2 Rural Landscape zones, and permitted with consent in the RU5 Village zone.

These legislative requirements are currently the basis for any investigations undertaken by Council into complaints received from Tweed residents in respect of STHL use.

"Once the State Government's full package of STHL reforms are introduced, it is Council's understanding that NSW Fair Trading will have the primary responsibility for responding to complaints made by residents in respect of the conduct of legitimate STHL operations. whilst NSW Councils will be responsible for STHLs that have commenced in an unauthorised manner under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979," Mr Connell said.

## Citizen scientists needed for **Tweed Coast's sea turtles**

Tweed residents and visitors are being asked to keep an eye out for marine visitors to our shore with the start of the sea turtle nesting season.

The season runs until March with two threatened species, green and loggerhead turtles, coming ashore from Tweed to Forster along the NSW coast.

NSW TurtleWatch project officer Holly West is encouraging locals to become citizen scientists and help to look and record turtle tracks and nests on the Tweed Coast.

"Beachgoers can play an important role in recording where the tracks are, what type of tracks they are (to determine species) and where possible nests may be located," Ms West said. "We also need beachgoers to report potential threats to the turtles

such as marine debris, light pollution and coastal erosion which could prevent them from finding suitable nesting sites.' National Park and Wildlife Services (NPWS) and NSW TurtleWatch

volunteers will work together to monitor nests and protect them from potential dangers. "Female turtles usually come ashore between dusk and dawn and

those early risers walking the beaches may be the ones to spot the nests first," she said. NSW TurtleWatch was developed by Australian Seabird Rescue and

is supported by the NSW Government's Saving Our Species program. To find out more or to report a sea turtle sighting, please

Not only might you gain tips on how to save costs and assist the environment, you could find yourself enjoying a break on the Tweed coast courtesy of Council.

A big focus of the event is to help the Tweed community join global efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Event organiser and Council's Sustainability Program Leader, Debbie Firestone, hopes participants' actions to reduce their environmental impacts can reach the 100 tonnes target.

"In the Tweed our average carbon footprint per person is nine tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions each year," Ms Firestone said.

"We'll need to halve that to meet global temperature targets. This event will provide practical tools and tips to measure the affect that each of us can have on reducing our impacts on climate change."

By pledging to do what you can do to reduce your carbon footprint and benefit the environment, you could go into the draw to win

# **Woodcrafters supported by Council grant funding**

Maintaining a healthy interest in wood working has become a lot easier for the Tweed Valley Woodcraft Association thanks to a community grant from Tweed Shire Council.

The association, which formed in 1996, has more than 60 members, both male and female, and meets at its purpose-built workshop and club rooms on the Murwillumbah Showground.

President Doug Robinson said the club enjoyed a strong relationship with Council and had received \$2000 through Community Sponsorship Policy funding to purchase and install an automated external defibrillator for the clubhouse.

"We have been very fortunate to have had Council support over a number of years - we received funding for our dust extraction project, a new drum sanding unit and this year the defibrillator and associated first aid kit," Mr Robinson said.

"Given that the majority of our members are retired, having this piece of equipment is a welcome addition to our club room."

He said the club had closed down due to COVID-19 restrictions from March to July but was now functioning again under an approved COVID-19 management plan.

"Since restarting, we have had a number of interested people seeking to join in recent weeks, however, in the interests of our existing members and the safety of likely new members we have closed membership for the remainder of this year," he said.

"Our association comprises of people from all walks of life who come together to learn and develop their woodcraft skills in a social and friendly atmosphere."

He said the focus was mainly on personal projects for the

members but they had undertaken works for various community organisations.

"Before the COVID-19 restrictions, we held open days to show what we do and had annual competitions against the Richmond Valley Woodcrafters but that has been put on hold also."
