# New flash flood warning system for villages

Residents in Burringbar, Mooball and Crabbes Creek are being asked to have their say on a new flash flood warning system for

The system is being developed because flood risk studies have shown that these areas are subject to flash flooding with little to no warning.

Council, with assistance from NSW State Emergency Service and other government agencies, is now set to build an automated system to provide advanced notice of approaching floods to local residents.

Manager Roads and Stormwater Danny Rose said a key consideration for flooding in the area is the lack of warning time.

"The small Burringbar Creek and Crabbes Creek catchments are not covered by Bureau of Meteorology flood warnings, as the time between rainfall and flooding is too short," Mr Rose said.

"Council is developing an automated flash flood warning system and we want all local residents to have their say to ensure it meets their needs now and into the future."

Local residents are encouraged to take part in a survey about the project by 4pm on Wednesday, 3 March 2021.

"Funded under the Natural Disaster Resilience Program and supported by the NSW and Commonwealth governments, the flash flood warning system will enable residents to prepare their properties and/or evacuate to a safe place prior to the onset of flooding," he said. The warning system will have two main components: flood forecasting and warning distribution.

The flood forecasting system will use cloud-based technology, which combines local rain and stream gauge data and Bureau of Meteorology forecasts, to predict flooding. It will distribute a warning advising of an approaching flood, the expected timeframe and magnitude at key locations.

"To develop an effective flash flood warning system, we need to hear from local residents to understand their flood concerns, how much warning time they need to prepare their homes and to evacuate, and their preferred communication method for receiving the warning," Mr Rose said.

Many areas of Burringbar and Crabbes Creek catchments are known to flood. Key areas of concern include:

- Dignan Street/Hunter Street/Tweed Valley Way areas of Burringbar
- Mooball (both north and south of the railway embankment)
- Crabbes Creek village
- various rural road crossings (e.g. Greenvale Court culvert). Visit www.yoursaytweed.com.au/flood-warning to complete the survey and for more information about the project.

# It pays to remain vigilant as COVID-19 pandemic milestone reached

It's been a year since the World Health Organisation declared an international public health emergency and the first cases of what was to become known as COVID-19 were detected in Australia.

Council is proud of the way the Tweed community has adapted to change in the face of adversity over the past 12 months, particularly with the ongoing impact of hard border closures.

While some restrictions have eased and cultural facilities reopened, Council is maintaining COVID-Safe practices in keeping with NSW Government directives to help keep our community safe.

Residents are reminded to maintain vigilance and adhere to displayed signage around entry and exit points at Council

sites, requirements around hand sanitisation and physical distancing measures.

Scanning of QR codes is required at most Council facilities, including at the Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, Brett Street CAFE, the civic centres, Tweed Regional Museum, community halls and auditoria, Richmond Tweed Regional Library branches and the majority of Tweed Regional Aquatic Centre pools.

Please check the relevant facility website, with booking required for some activities, including swimming at the TRAC pool at Murwillumbah and for the 2020 Archibald Prize Regional Tour exhibiting at the gallery until 7 March 2021.

In relation to Council staff, under a carefully planned strategy, those who have been working from home for much of the past year will be transitioned back to work during February and March, with flexible working conditions arranged where required and consistent with Council's service delivery requirements.

Online meetings will continue as appropriate, while community gatherings and events must ensure COVID-Safe plans are in place.

Residents are encouraged to remain vigilant and get tested if any COVID-19 systems are experienced.

### Tip kept busy with holidays and warmer weather

Staff at the Stotts Creek Resource Recovery Centre have been kept on their toes over the holiday break due to COVID-19 restrictions keeping people at home.

In a 4-week period which covered the 2 weeks before Christmas and 2 weeks after, Council recorded 1,398 tonnes of waste from household collections. This was up by 148 tonnes from 2019/20 which recorded 1,250 tonnes.

The wet and humid spring and summer which increased green waste from kerbside collection for the same period of time was also up with 1,275 tonnes collected compared to 944 tonnes the previous year.

Residents brought a further 349 tonnes of household green waste to the Resource Recovery Centre compared to 205 tonnes in the previous year.

Council Unit Coordinator - Resource Recovery Rod Dawson said that there were a number of contributing factors that potentially led to the increase in waste collected and delivered.

"In 2019/20, we were in the grips of a drought so garden growth wasn't as prolific," Mr Dawson said.

"Over the same time this year, we had people staying at home more due to COVID-19 restrictions, coupled with a wetter summer. The amount of green waste is likely a reflection of people spending more time around their homes."

Over the holidays, demand on town park bins remained constant over the same comparison time with 72 tonnes collected in 2019/20 and 73 tonnes in 2020/21.

Patronage to the Tweed JUNKtion: Tip Shop Treasures was down over this Christmas with 693 customers visiting in search of a bargain as opposed to 984 the previous Christmas. However, the drop in customers can be attributed to the fact the shop was closed for a week due to floods in December 2020.

"Border restrictions also played a role with Queenslanders who were regulars being forced to stay away," he said.

Tweed Shire Council goes online this week to talk Rail Trail.

The first of 4 information sessions will be held on Wednesday (10 February) from 3 to 4pm and Thursday from 10 to 11am.

Anyone can attend a session by opening Google Chrome and logging into BlueJeans (similar to Zoom) at the scheduled time.

The other 2 sessions will be held next week.

Construction of the Tweed section of the proposed Northern Rivers Rail Trail is due to begin within months, now that all government funding contributions needed to deliver the project have been secured and the corridor has been formally closed as an active railway line.

The online sessions will provide information about designing and constructing the Tweed section of the trail from Murwillumbah to Crabbes Creek.

Session attendees will be able to ask questions of Council's Project Director lain Lonsdale and the NSW Public Works Advisory Project Manager, Alex Manning, after a presentation of information.

"The community will learn what's been done to date and what is being done now to help all 4 prospective tenderers prepare their final detailed design submissions as part of their tender submissions," Mr Lonsdale said.

## Night road works begin around Tweed Heads

Council has engaged East Coast Asphalt and Concrete Edging to profile, seal and re-asphalt various roads in Tweed Heads during February and March 2021.

Night roadworks started this week at Minjungbal Drive from Rivendell Drive north past Frizelle Sunshine Tweed Used Cars yard. Only the northbound lane is open

Night roadworks at Wharf Street (on the bowls club side) from Florence Street to south of Brett Street have also started in the southbound lane only.

Weather permitting, other roadworks have also been scheduled:

- Wharf Street (southern end) Sunday 14 to Thursday 18 February 2021, night roadworks at Wharf Street from Terranora Terrace to Kennedy Drive on ramp
- Brett Street Sunday 14 to Sunday 21 February, night roadworks from Keith Compton Drive to Powell Street
- Powell Street Sunday 14 to Tuesday 23 February, night roadworks from Brett Street to Frances Street
- Powell Street Tuesday 16 to Tuesday 23 February, night roadworks from Frances Street to Florence Street including Florence Street roundabout
- Ivory Crescent, Ivory Place, McGregor Crescent and Florence Place - Thursday 25 February to Friday 5 March, day roadworks.

Night roadworks hours are from 7pm to 6am (NSW time). Day roadworks hours are from 7am to 5pm. Traffic control may set up outside of these times in order to make the work zone clear of vehicles.
