Managing soil erosion and water on Cudgen Plateau

An upcoming field day will examine soil erosion - a major challenge for growers on the Cudgen Plateau.

Soil health, farm management practices and overall farm design significantly influence the rate of soil loss from farms.

Council is running the field day to share information with growers about the innovative methods one Cudgen farmer is using to reduce soil erosion and better manage the movement of water across his farm.

The workshop will cover:

- · causes and impacts of soil erosion on the Cudgen Plateau
- · innovative strategies being used to reduce erosion
- farm design principles for water retention and erosion

management • the importance of ground cover and riparian buffers

• the role of sediment basins rules for constructing dams and harvestable rights.

Guest speakers will include Ken Yeomans, Keyline Designs

Consulting Service; Abigail Jenkins, NSW Department of Primary Industries (DPI) Soil Unit and Melissa Hundy, Water NSW. The field day will be held on Thursday 22 April 2021 from 9am to

Food For Thought – feeding people, not landfill

Feeding people at the same time as reducing food waste, is the aim of a new regional food donation campaign initiated by NE Waste

The campaign, 'It's Food For Thought', is a collaboration with member councils - including Tweed - Northern Rivers Food, Northern Rivers Area Health Service, NSW Environment Protection Authority and the Love Food Hate Waste Program, which aims to attract new food donors and support food donation agencies in feeding people.

Project Coordinator for NE Waste Karen Rudkin said charities have seen a significant increase in the frequency of demand for food relief due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"In 2019, 15 per cent of Australians experiencing food insecurity were seeking food relief at least once a week. In 2020, this doubled to 31 per cent," she said.

To assist food donation agencies to access more food from within the Northern Rivers region, NE Waste has developed a range of resources aimed at supporting and encouraging food businesses to donate excess or surplus food products or meals.

This includes a free toolkit, which highlights where and how to donate and the economic incentives to do so. It also debunks common myths around health and safety issues when donating. Food businesses that donate their excess or surplus stock can

benefit financially, environmentally and socially - from diverting waste from landfill, feeding hungry bellies and from the tax incentives associated with donations.

Youth Council identifies key issues for young people

The 2021 Tweed Youth Council found out first hand just how disruptive COVID-19 can be when it met for its April meeting in the Murwillumbah Council Chambers last week.

Youth Council Chair Montana Markland had to join the meeting via Zoom, having to abide by restrictions and self-quarantine due to a recent visit to Brisbane.

The virtual element to the meeting didn't prove to be too much of a disruption, as the Council members discussed issues of importance they want to address during the year.

The 13 Youth Councillors, representing seven schools from across the Tweed, had been asked at their first meeting in February about issues of concern for youth.

- They included (in no order):
- giving young people a voice and using various platforms to have concerns heard
- feeling safe in the community, especially on public transport
- dealing with stress providing resources to support students manage study workload, sport, work and other responsibilities

- youth mental health and what services are available • promoting events to young people
- · advertising and promotion of facilities and services.

In identifying key issues, the challenge Chair Montana Markland and her fellow Youth Councillors agreed on, was to provide a reliable platform for young people across the Tweed to speak up and be heard.

"This year we will be selecting two specific issues that affect youth in the community to focus on. We will then try our best to create an adequate solution to these issues and help as many people as we can through these solutions," Montana said.

The Tweed Youth Council is a representative body for all Tweed youth with direct access to Council.

It welcome matters of concern, suggestions and ideas which would affect or be beneficial to youth.


