Flood has multi-million dollar impact on Tweed businesses

The devastating February flood which hit the Tweed is estimated to have cost local businesses more than \$57 million in damages and loss of trade.

The staggering figure comes from self-assessments of the flood impact by 193 Tweed businesses who voluntarily responded to Council's Business Flood Impact Assessment survey.

Council will use the information to advocate for greater funding assistance and support for businesses hit by the flood.

The Business Flood Impact Assessment asked businesses to provide a self-assessment on the cost of damage to premises, equipment and stock and the potential loss of trade. It also requested information on the number of staff affected.

The survey found the estimated cost of the flood to the Tweed business community to be around \$57,183,565 with 1,855 full and part-time staff impacted.

Data extracted from the survey shows just how hard the business community was hit, and the information will be used to present a strong case to the State and Federal Governments for more support

for businesses to help get them back up and operating and their staff return to work.

Small businesses made up 91% of responders to the survey, with 86 of them forced to close due to the flood.

The floods impacted a broad range of businesses and industries across the Tweed to varying degrees, with the heaviest impacted regions being the South Murwillumbah Industrial Area, Murwillumbah CBD, Chinderah and Tumbulgum.

Businesses directly affected suffered a loss in trade, with roads and communications cut, a loss of stock and damage to their premises.

This data does not include the cost of the clean-up.

The business assessment survey opened in the days after the flood and closed on Friday 18 March.

Council launches Mayoral Flood Appeal

Community members keen to make a donation to flood-affected residents and businesses of the Tweed can now do so via the **Together Tweed Mayoral Flood Appeal**

Tweed Shire Council launched its Mayoral Flood Appeal this week following a unanimous vote at last week's Council meeting.

The Together Tweed Mayoral Flood Appeal 2022 seeks to raise much-needed funds to offer affected Tweed communities immediate help, support recovery efforts and resilience to future flood events and contribute to addressing significant long-term issues such as housing.

The February 2022 flood was the biggest in the Tweed's recorded history. Many areas experienced unprecedented river levels and the damage bill is likely to exceed the devastating 2017 flood event.

While local residents and businesses may be eligible for assistance from the Federal and NSW Government's Natural Disaster Declarations, many people in the Tweed have been significantly affected by this flood event and will require extensive support to get back on their feet.

Consistent with the Council resolution, the Mayoral appeal will support:

- Murwillumbah Community Centre contribute toward the purchase of a replacement community bus.
- Communication solutions for isolated communities purchase of improved communications equipment to help isolated communities stay connected in times of crisis

Once these needs are met, the balance of the funds collected through the Mayoral Flood Appeal will be distributed equally among the following organisations.

- The Family Centre The Locals Helping Locals Flood Appeal will distribute funds raised directly to children, families and young people impacted by the floods in the Tweed Shire.
- Northern Rivers Community Foundation (NRCF) The Resilience and Regeneration Fund will award grants to help community organisations work in the early, medium and long term recovery phases in affected communities in the Tweed Shire, following the emergency relief effort.
- NSW State Emergency Service (SES) Support for local units to recruit, train and develop volunteers to effectively act and respond to protect people in the Tweed from dangers to their

health and safety and property from destruction or damage in future emergencies.

"The Tweed has a long history of coming together in times of adversity and I know the community is already coming together now to support each other in the wake of this devastating flood," said Tweed Mayor Chris Cherry.

"They have rescued their neighbours and given them a safe place to stay, they are lending a hand clearing out and cleaning, they are volunteering their time, donating goods and offering a shoulder to

"Many locals, as well as friends and family members from across the country and the world, are looking for ways to help and support flood-affected communities here in the Tweed."

The local organisations receiving the funds raised from the Mayoral flood appeal will support affected communities in the Tweed today, tomorrow and into the future.

Flood clean-up progressing faster than expected

The Tweed's flood clean-up is progressing faster than projected and is expected to be completed a week earlier than initially forecast.

Council would like to thank the community for working so co-operatively with our clean-up crews, by listening to and heeding our caution messages. This has allowed the clean-up to progress much quicker than initially estimated.

Once clean-up crews complete their final pass in the coming week. a second pass of flood-affected areas will take place. If your property has been missed in the first pass, please let Council know by calling

The community is asked not to place any additional flood waste on the kerb as it won't be collected. Flood-affected residents and businesses are able to drop flood waste off for free at the Stotts Creek Resource Recovery Centre (tip) until close of business on Sunday 27 March.

The tip will return to normal opening hours for the public from Saturday 26 March, to accept the last remaining flood waste. Only materials that were flood-affected will be accepted for free.

Asbestos can only be accepted from Tweed Shire addresses and must be treated appropriately. Visit tweed.nsw.gov.au/asbestos for more info on transport and disposal.

Reserve Creek Rd expected to remain closed for months

Diversions will remain on Reserve Creek Road for at least 6 months after a geotechnical assessment found the roadway to be significantly undermined and too dangerous for temporary repairs.

Council is excavating the remaining road to prevent motorists from by-passing barricades blocking the roadway, which was severely damaged by a major landslide during the recent flood.

It is expected Reserve Creek Road will be closed for 6 to 12 months. in the area of the landslip.

Council's Manager Roads and Stormwater Danny Rose said the geotechnical assessment provided an understanding of the full extent of the flood damage to Reserve Creek Road.

"To ensure the safety of road users, Reserve Creek Road will remain closed until permanent repairs can be made," Mr Rose said.

Crews are on site this week to remove the unstable section of the road and install additional barricades. Further geotechnical investigations will follow to determine the permanent repair to the road

Council apologises for any inconvenience caused, especially to local residents, and asks for patience as we work towards a more permanent repair.

Motorists are further urged not to tamper with road closed signs or barriers as this is a serious offence and could result in someone being

Further geotechnical assessments are also underway at several

other sites in the Tweed where major landslips occurred. Council estimates damage to the Tweed's road network by the recent flood could cost around \$40 million and take up to 2 years to repair,

Starting Block Café helps Pay It Forward

After the terrible few weeks experienced by so many in the Tweed, it's more important than ever to share goodwill and generosity.

The Starting Block Café, located at the Tweed Regional Aquatic Centre (TRAC) Murwillumbah pool complex, set up a Pay It Forward scheme in 2021 which has seen \$575 donated back to the community in food and drink credits.

Café Operations Officer Katrina Mudge said the generosity of people visiting the café and the pool had been heart-warming.

"There is currently \$295 available in the fund which is about enough to donate 20 coffees, about 9 snacks and 7 meals to people in need," Ms Mudge said.

"With the loss and devastation people have faced recently, we want

to make sure the community knows they can come here to get a coffee or a meal which just might take the pressure off for the day."

A blackboard is displayed each day showing how many Pay It Forward credits are available from the café.

"Please come and enjoy a meal, knowing the people of the Tweed have your back," she said.

To contribute to the Pay it Forward scheme, simply stop in at the café and make a donation towards a \$5, \$10 or \$15 meal credit.

Initiated by the Red Cross, the scheme assists vulnerable members of the community through participating businesses by providing free drinks or food. It also promotes kindness, is not judgemental and is open to anyone in need.

Australian Defence Force Major General visits Tweed

The head of the Australian Defence Force (ADF) Joint Task Force 629 Major General David Thomae paid a visit to troops in the Tweed on Monday as part of an inspection of the Northern Rivers.

Major General Thomae's Task Force is involved with flood recovery in both South East Queensland and the Northern Rivers.

After meeting with Mayor of Tweed Chris Cherry and Byron Mayor Michael Lyon, he headed out to meet with Army, Navy and Air Force personnel involved in the clean-up and recovery.

The ADF has more than 3,800 personnel on the ground across the Northern Rivers including about 600 troops in the Tweed. They have helped to remove more than 3,000 tonnes of flood debris so far.

Major General Thomae started his inspection by visiting troops at Knox Park where they were involved in removing contaminated soft-fall soil from the children's playgrounds. Troops from each of the armed

forces formed a barrow line, emptying the contaminants into a Council truck for safe disposal.

After addressing troops and providing them with an update on the overall progress of the operation, he proceeded to Chinderah where the ADF are involved with waste removal.

Major General Thomae said discussions with local mayors were crucial in ensuring the ADF's recovery efforts were on track and meeting the needs of local communities.
