New street trees for Murwillumbah's town centre

Tweed Shire Council is launching the Murwillumbah Street Tree Replacement Project which will result in the planting of 4 new street trees in important local spaces where trees have previously been removed.

The initiative is part of the Cool Towns Urban Forest Program which focuses on bringing more greenery and shade to the community.

Starting 19 May 2025, Council will be removing old trees stumps and root systems, cutting and removing existing concrete and installing new garden beds, seating areas and planting the 2-year-old trees.

Work will take 1-2 weeks at each location:

• 118 Murwillumbah St (next to the Post Office)

- 116 Murwillumbah St (next to Westpac)
- 44–54 Murwillumbah St (next to Tursa Employment)
- Brisbane St & Proudfoot Ln (next to IGA corner) The selected species is Tristaniopsis Laurina

'Luscious' (Watergum) – chosen for its beauty and shade potential.

Phase 2 will expand to 7 more locations within the Murwillumbah CBD pending future funding.

The project is funded through the Australian Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program

Taking Action for Safer Roads – National Road Safety Week

National Road Safety Week runs from 11–18 May, reminding us that everyone has a role to play in keeping our roads safe – whether you're driving, cycling, or walking.

In 2024, three lives were lost on Tweed roads. While road crashes have dropped by nearly 24% and fatalities have decreased by 19% over the last five years, there's still more to do.

Tweed Shire Council's Roads and Stormwater Manager Danny Rose said community involvement is key: "We all have a responsibility to make safer choices. This week is a great opportunity to reflect on our role and commit to safer practices."

This year, Council will continue its tradition by lighting up Murwillumbah bridge with yellow lights and displaying yellow ribbon stickers on fleet vehicles and

buses to promote road safety.

With more people using e-bikes and e-scooters, Council is teaming up with the City of Gold Coast to highlight the legal differences between NSW and QLD and promote safe riding.

A pop-up safety event will be held at Queen Elizabeth Park, Coolangatta on Thursday 15 May between 8am and 11am, with more planned for June.

Engaging and shaping our future together

The Murwillumbah Civic Centre Auditorium came alive with discussion last Friday morning, as a wide range of Tweed community and industry organisations came together for the first Resident, Environment and Industry Group Roundtable (REIGR) for 2025.

The aim of the session was to help shape the future of the Tweed together, through engaging on the draft Community Strategic Plan 2025–2035 and other documents in the Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework.

REIGR is a forum for Council to inform, engage and listen to local community and interest group representatives. It's a place to share updates on Council priorities and projects, gather feedback, and hear the views of local community representatives.

Participants heard about the framework and the role of Council and the community in creating a shared vision for where the Tweed wants to be in 10 years' time.

Other topics explored included: where the data shows we are now, planning together for how we will get there, as well as discussion on Council's role in knowing how we have arrived.

Feedback from the session will be used to shape the final versions of the documents.

A wide range of community and industry organisations came together last week to share their views on the Community Strategic Plan and other key documents currently on exhibition.

Can you spot a koala that needs help?

Here in the Tweed, we are lucky to share our home with a small but precious population of wild koalas. Although they do their best to survive on their own, sometimes they need our help.

One of the biggest threats to koalas in the Northern Rivers is chlamydia, a fast-spreading disease that causes blindness, infertility and can even cause death. It can affect koalas of any age, and early detection can save lives.

Koalas spend most of their time high in the trees, and they do come down to the ground it can sometimes be a sign that they're unwell. That's why it's important to pay close attention if you see a koala on the ground or unusually low in a tree.

Koalas may look fine at first glance but closer attention can reveal signs of illness. Look out for:

- Sore eyes red, swollen, or crusty
- Stained rump yellow or brown, or obviously wet
- Unusual behaviour sitting on the ground or very low in a tree, not moving away when approached

If you notice any of these signs act quickly and report it to give the koala the best chance of survival.
