Home-based Business Small Business Guide

This guide is designed for residents intending to operate a business from their home in the Tweed Shire. This information is not applicable to home occupations (sex services) in the Shire.

Home-based businesses need to comply with the relevant Local Environment Plan and applicable State based legislation. Tweed Shire Council has a role in ensuring home-based businesses are compatible with the amenity and environment of the local area.

Whilst Council will provide assistance and advice regarding permissibility and compliance, it is the business operator's duty to ensure that the operation of their business complies with the relevant regulatory standards. The aim of this guide is to direct business owners to the correct information.



Home-based businesses defined

Home-based businesses are defined within each of the three Local Environment Plans (LEP) that apply to the Tweed Shire. There are three definitions that apply to home-based business:

- home business;
- home occupation; and
- home industry.

These definitions are outlined in the Dictionary at the end of the LEPs. A link to each of the LEPs and maps of where each LEP applies can be found on Councils <u>Plans, Policies and Controls</u> web page.

It is recommended that you contact Council and speak to a Duty Planner to determine if these definitions apply to your proposed home-based business.

Free Planning Technical Advice Service

Council has a free planning technical advice service if you have any queries regarding your home-based business. Some of the questions that the Duty Planner may ask include:

- Where is the location of the home-based business;
- What are the activities carried out in your home in relation to your home-base business?
- Are alterations to your home required to operate your business?
- How many people will be employed by the home-based business?

On some occasions the Duty Planner may ask you to put your request into writing to ensure you are provided with the most accurate information for your particular proposal.

Is development consent required for your home-based business?

For Tweed City Centre LEP 2012 and Tweed LEP 2014:

If your home-based business strictly complies with either of the definitions for home-based businesses, then your business is defined as being **Exempt Development** under the <u>State</u> <u>Environmental Planning Policy (Exempt and</u> <u>Complying Development Codes) 2008,</u> also known as the Codes SEPP. Exempt development does not require development consent from Council.

It is the responsibility of the business operator to ensure that their home-based business complies with the relevant definition.

If you are located within the area that **LEP 2000** applies or if your proposed home-based business does not meet either of the home-based business definitions, contact Council for further advice regarding the requirements for your proposal.

Building work

Even if your home-based business is Exempt and does not require consent, any building work to accommodate the home-based business may need consent. For example the conversion of a garage for a home office will require approval to ensure all alterations comply with the relevant standards and Council policies. Speak to a Duty Planner if you are planning alterations to your home in relation to your business.



Signage

Businesses that comply with either of the definitions for home-based business as defined in the LEP's may display a single business identification signage without development consent. For any such signage to be considered exempt from requiring consent it must comply with the Advertising and Signage Exempt Development Code of the <u>Codes SEPP</u>.

Beauty services and tattooing

Home-based businesses that involve skin penetration may require development consent. Skin penetration procedures include activities such as tattooing, body piercing, waxing or any other process by which the skin is penetrated. Contact the Duty Planner to enquire if you require development consent for business involving skin penetration.

The <u>Public Health Act 2010</u> requires Council to register premises where skin penetration procedures are carried out and to inspect premises to monitor the health standards of operations in such premises. Home-based food business

The preparation of food in your home for sale at markets, for retail distribution, catering services or not-for-profit organisations is considered a homebased business. However high risk foods including (but not limited to), curries, casseroles, pates, sauces and food containing raw eggs are **not** **suitable** for preparation in domestic kitchens. Contact Councils' Environmental Health Unit regarding requirements for your proposed business.

Home-based food businesses are required to be registered with Council and are inspected by Council's Environmental Health Officers to ensure compliance with the Food Act 2003 and Food Safety Standards.

Council provides free on-line food safety training via <u>I'm Alert Food Safety</u> training program. Refer to the Food Safety Training link on Council's <u>Food</u> <u>Business</u> web page.

Home-based child care

For Tweed City Centre LEP 2012 and Tweed LEP 2014:

Home-based child care does not require development consent if the proposal complies with the definition in the LEP and Subdivision 23 of the <u>Codes SEPP</u>. You will need to refer to Council's <u>Mapping</u> web page to see if your home is in a bush-fire zone.

For homes within a Bushfire Zone or if you are located within the area covered by **LEP 2000** you will require development approval. Call Council's Duty Planner to discuss your proposal.

Learn to swim classes

Providing swimming lessons in your pool at home is **not** defined as a home-based business. This activity is defined as a Recreation Facility (Outdo or) and requires a development application to Council to seek approval to use your pool for the purpose of providing swimming lessons.



Other regulatory and compliance (Non-council)

NSW Food Authority

The business may be required to have a **Food Safety Supervisor** if it processes and sells ready to eat food, potentially hazardous food (requires temperature control) or food that is not sold in the supplier's original packaging.

Food safety officers from the NSW Food Authority and environmental health officers (EHOs) from Council are entitled to visit and inspect premises involved in a food business. Inspection fees may be charged by either agency.
