Find out about candidates before casting your vote

Residents who've decided to cast their vote early at a pre-polling venue in the Tweed might have noticed things are a little bit different this year.

As part of its COVID-Safe plan, the NSW Electoral Commission is restricting the distribution of electoral material within 100 metres of polling booths, including at pre-poll.

In practical terms, this means the volunteers supporting the various candidate teams are not able to hand out 'how to vote' cards at polling stations as traditionally occurs at elections.

If you would like copies of 'how to vote' cards, the material has also been registered with the NSW Electoral Commission

and is available on its website.

Voting is compulsory in local government elections. This year, any person who is enrolled to vote may vote via pre-poll, with 5 pre-polling stations open across the Tweed from 9 am to 5 pm every day (except Sunday 28 November) until the election on Saturday 4 December.

The field day is being delivered by Council's Sustainable Agriculture team alongside Tweed farmers Rhonda and Greg James, who will host the event on their 220 hectare cattle grazing property at Cudgera Creek on Thursday 16 December 2021.

Rhonda and Greg have been balancing farming and natural area restoration on their property for more than 40 years. Rhonda is also one of Australia's most experienced and highly respected restoration ecologists and a former bushland restoration educator with TAFE NSW.

Tweed rejoins Arts Northern Rivers

The Tweed's active community of artists and creatives are set to benefit following a 4-year agreement by Tweed Shire Council to rejoin the region's peak arts body, Arts Northern Rivers (ANR).

Tweed will join Byron Shire, Lismore City, Richmond Valley, Kyogle Shire and Clarence Valley councils and contribute \$25,000 annually to ANR for the next 4 years.

The key benefit as a contributing council to ANR is access to the organisation's network which works towards generating, promoting and advocating for the arts and creative industries in the Northern Rivers.

Tweed artists will have access to ANR's annual program of skills and professional development workshops and training opportunities, free advice, referrals, and importantly, assistance in preparing grant funding applications and the provision of letters of support

Why Leave Town cards make great Christmas gifts

Shopping locally and knowing that money spent is staying in the Murwillumbah business community are two of the factors which appeal to Why Leave Town card holder Vanelle Bedser.

Ms Bedser and work colleague Sam Rasmussen are accountants at Mayberry Meldrum Anderson Accountants and Tax Consultants in South Murwillumbah which presented all staff with Why Leave Town

The card came as a pleasant surprise for Ms Bedser who is a strong supporter of the campaign.

"This a definite winner for local businesses who have been doing it tough for the past 18 months," she said.

"The Why Leave Town program is so simple to use, it's straightforward and with a variety of local businesses coming on board, it is great for local shoppers and the town.

"The card is convenient and it's good to know that the money you spend stays in the community."

Ms Rasmussen said the cards were a great gift idea, not just for businesses and their staff but also to be given out family and friends, especially with Christmas coming up.

"The beauty of this card is that you know that your money is supporting local businesses," she said.

The Why Leave Town campaign, run as a trial program in Murwillumbah, is supported by Council, The Tweed Tourism Company and the Murwillumbah and District Business Chamber.

Since being launched in July, the Why Leave Town campaign has seen more than 50 businesses and services sign up and more than 100 cards loaded up by locals with nearly \$10,000 ready to be injected into the local economy.

The cards can be loaded up with any amount of money from \$10 to \$1,000 and are valid for up to 3 years.

They can be 'loaded up' at The Foundry Murwillumbah and Tweed Regional Aquatic Centre, Murwillumbah and used at participating businesses across town.

Asbestos could be lurking in your renovation

Renovating? Make sure you know what you are dealing with before you begin.

It's National Asbestos Awareness Week (22-28 November) and this year's campaign asks Australians to Think Twice About Asbestos.

In homes built before 1990, asbestos can still be found anywhere. This affects one in 3 homes nationwide.

At least one-third of projects that started in last 5 years began during COVID-19 restrictions and more than half of Australians are 'DIYers'.

Asbestos can be found inside and outside your home in things such as carpet underlay, tiling, ceiling panels, gutters and downpipes as well as in buried waste material.

Disposal of this material is hazardous and cannot be disposed of in a kerbside bin or mixed into a general waste load. This places workers and the environment at risk.

Council have kits available for testing small amounts of asbestos at properties in the Tweed. These kits can be purchased at the front desk of the Murwillumbah Civic Centre and dropped off at a post office or in a post box in the safely sealed package provided. The cost is \$51.40 for the 2020/2021 financial year (cost recovery only in which 2 samples can be tested).
