The awards are held every 2 years and celebrate local sustainability champions and eco-friendly initiatives across the Tweed community. This year, Council is excited to announce a new category - Tweed Tourism and Hospitality Sustainability.

You can nominate an individual, school, local business, a tourism or hospitality provider, club, group or event which is helping to protect and enhance the Tweed's internationally significant environment.

- There are 4 award categories:
- Regenerative Agriculture: Recognising outstanding contributions to the restoration of soils, waterways and biodiversity in agriculture.
- Wildlife and Habitat Conservation: Recognising outstanding contributions to the protection and conservation or active
- management of wildlife and native habitat. Tweed Tourism and Hospitality Sustainability: Recognising outstanding contributions by tourism and hospitality operators who demonstrate exceptional commitment to the environment, community and economic development of the region.

More Council closures during stay-at-home restrictions

Council has temporarily closed the remainder of its non-essential services in keeping with the NSW Government's latest COVID-19 restrictions for regional NSW.

The NSW Government announced on Saturday that all people who live in regional NSW, including the Tweed, would be subject to stay-athome orders from 5 pm Saturday 14 August until 12:01 am on Sunday 22 August as part of measures to limit the spread of the virus.

- As a result, Council has shut its customer-facing facilities including: • Customer Service counters at Murwillumbah and Tweed Heads
- Stotts Creek Resource Recovery Centre (tip) closed to residents, except for essential and commercial waste disposal or waste that may become a public health issue
- **Tweed Regional Aquatic Centres**
- Starting Block Café at TRAC Murwillumbah only open for takeaway meals and beverages
- · Tweed Holiday Parks, with some exceptions, including for permanent residents, overnight travellers, persons working

in the local area and persons who have no other place of permanent residence.

These closures and additional details are listed on Council's COVID-19 Emergency Dashboard and are in addition to those already announced last week, including Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre, Tweed Regional Museum, Tweed JUNKtion Tip Shop, library branches at Murwillumbah, Tweed Heads and Kingscliff, Visitor Information Centres, Council events and Council-approved community markets on Council-owned land - Kingscliff, SALT Village, Pottsville, Murwillumbah and Tweed Heads (the Murwillumbah Farmers' Market is not held on Council-owned land)

Essential services including water and kerbside waste collection services will operate as normal.

The Council meeting on Thursday 19 August will be a virtual meeting only - for Councillors, staff and the general public and will be livestreamed. For details on how to join go to tweed.nsw.gov.au/councillors-meetings

We want to hear from you - tell Council your pedestrian and bike network ideas

Council is hosting a series of interactive surveys and workshops to seek community input on shaping the Tweed's future pedestrian and bike network.

The feedback will be used to inform the development of a new Tweed Pedestrian and Bike Plan – a 10-year action plan for delivering pedestrian and cycling infrastructure across the Tweed.

Council is keen to hear from cyclists with all levels of experience as well as all types of pedestrians, including people who walk, run, push a pram, use a wheelchair, mobility aid, mobility scooter, roller skates or skateboard.

- A range of feedback is being sought, including on:
- · where new footpaths, crossings or on-road cycle lanes should be upgraded or built
- where safety can be improved (visibility, separation from cars, lower speeds)

where accessibility can be improved (access for prams,

wheelchairs, mobility scooters)

 where comfort can be improved (shade, seating, water fountains). Council's Road Safety Officer Alana Brooks said it was important

the plan was developed in keeping with the needs of those who use the facilities.

"The Tweed is such an incredible place to live and visit and we know just how much the community loves to get outdoors and enjoy the magnificent scenery around us - especially now when we're under COVID-19 restrictions," she said.

"We're interested to hear from residents about their ideas on how we can improve our pedestrian and bike paths and facilities. We want to learn if there are any opportunities that would encourage people to walk or cvcle more often."

Miconia weed discovered in the Lismore area

The highly invasive Miconia weed has been re-discovered in the Lismore area near Tuntable Creek. Also known as the 'Purple Plague' this tree invades rainforests, competes with native vegetation for resources and reduces habitat for native fauna. When established and in large numbers, Miconia can cause expansive hillside erosion due to its shallow root system.

The plant is easily identifiable by its very large leaves – between 20 and 80cm long, which are purple underneath.





This is the first Miconia plant to be found in the Far North Coast region in a few years. The reported tree was mature and fruiting, meaning seeds may have already been distributed by birds and mammals. Please be vigilant in checking your property and assessing for weeds, including Miconia. Your discovery can protect our environment and save our region millions of dollars.

This weed is classified as 'Prohibited Matter' under the *NSW Biosecurity Act 2015*, meaning any known plants must be reported to your local weeds authority – Rous County Council – immediately on 02 6623 3800.
